

After the "unassigned lands" were opened to non-Native settlers, Guthrie was formed and was the capitol from 1907-1910. Guthrie became a prominent railway hub for the entire nation. In 1889, Guthrie established public schools. The population decreased during the Great Depression.

Absolute location: 35°N, 97°W

Located in the "panhandle" of Oklahoma, Guymon was once a part of "no-man's land." In 1890, that area that is now Guymon was assigned to the Oklahoma Territory. From 1901-1902 a post office and railways were established. Guymon has a heavy dependence on the agricultural industry, leaving it devastated during the Dust Bowl.

Absolute location: 36°N, 101°W






Oklahoma City is the 2nd capitol for Oklahoma. Formerly Guthrie, Oklahoma City was voted to be the new capital of Oklahoma in 1889 because of its more central location. Oklahoma City incorporated in 1890 and is the largest city in Oklahoma. There are different types of industry present and various ethnic districts.

Absolute location: 35°N, 95°W

Originally named "Brockway," four communities came together to establish Shawnee. This land originally belonged to the Creek/Seminole Tribes. Today, Shawnee is host to Oklahoma Baptist University.

Absolute location: 35°N, 96°W





Tulsa is the 2nd Largest city in Oklahoma. In 1882 the St. Louis and San Francisco Railroads came to the area and Tulsa was established. In 1901 oil was discovered in the area and Tulsa became a player in the petroleum industry. In 1921, the Tulsa Race Riot occurred and 40 square blocks of Tulsa were destroyed.

Absolute location: 36°N, 95°W

Founded in 1891, Yukon sprang into existence because of railroads. Yukon is known as the "Czech Capital of Oklahoma" because of the ties many of its people have the Czech heritage. Because of its fertile land, Yukon is involved in the farming and ranching industry. Absolute location: 35°N, 97°W
